Iteration - 1 & 2	8 Full Length Tests	In both the iterations, candidates are expected to study the complete syllabus and write full syllabus tests – paper wise. A timeline of 8 weeks has been set for this.
Iteration - 3	5 Open Tests	Write 4 Open Tests + Essay as per UPSC timings and schedule – ten days before the examination – so that you rehearse performing well in our classrooms – before you write the actual exam in UPSC Examination Hall. These copies will not be evaluated and are only for the purpose of simulating the exam experience.
