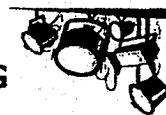
Let's make the internet a better place!

SPOTLIGHT ON CYBERBULLYING

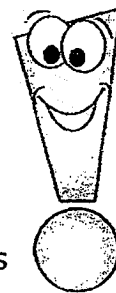


What are some examples of cyberbullying?

- Hurtful messages, texts or emails
- Embarrassing photos or videos
- Excluding someone online
- Spreading false rumours about someone online

How can you stand up to cyberbullying?

1. **STAY CALM** – An agitated response may trigger more bullying
2. **RECORD THE EVIDENCE** – Take screenshots or save messages, comments, photos or videos that show bullying
3. **BLOCK THE BULLY** – Prevent the bully from contacting you
4. **CONFIDE IN SOMEONE** – Let trusted adults like your parents or teachers know and seek their support and advice



If you know that your friend is being cyberbullied, speak to your friend openly and show that you care. Be supportive and sensible, and advise your friend to confide in trusted adults.

Primary 4 Pupils

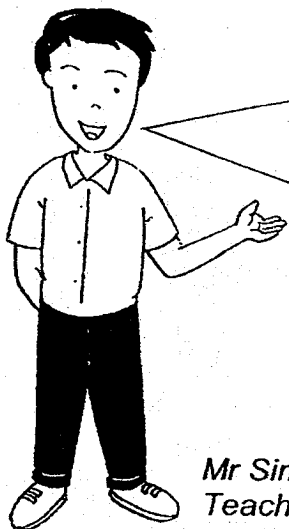
